SPEAKERS NOTICE

GENERAL COUNCIL MEETING (JULY 3-4, 2020)

Dear General Council Members,

I provide this notice to advise all Teslin Tlingit Council Clans, Clan Leaders and appointed Clan Spokespersons and General Council members that a General Council meeting has been scheduled for July 3-4, 2020

Please note that the General Council meeting will be coordinated and managed to ensure compliance with the COVID19 health directives, issued by Yukon Chief Medical Officer (CMO) Dr. Brendan Hanley. Specifically, the primary location of the General Council meeting will be the Heritage Center. Effective July 1, Dr. Hanley has indicated we can hold outdoor gatherings of 50 people or less while social distancing. We will hold our meeting in the tent with the sides off to accommodate this requirement from the CMO's office so please wear appropriate clothing for the event based on the weather. Proper distancing will occur at the event along with the provision of hand sanitizer and proper disinfection protocols will be followed. Snacks, lunch and beverages will be prepared at the TTC kitchen and individually packaged (no buffet). Those wishing to attend the meeting by zoom from your home will have that option. We can provide space for up to 10 elders inside

the heritage center while social distancing to listen to the meeting. Microphones will only be provided to the clan spokesperson and they will speak on behalf of the clan.

Objective of the General Council Meeting.

There are three objectives of the General Council meeting, as outlined in the attached draft agenda, which are:

1. Amend section 11.3 of the Constitution to address current and future circumstances respecting the selection of the Naa Sháade Háni and Deputy Naa Sháade Háni.
2. Approve the leadership selection process to fill the position of the Naa Sháade Háni at the upcoming Annual General Council Assembly.
3. Authorize the Executive Council to preserve and advance Teslin Tlingit aboriginal and treaty rights and interests in response to the impending Yukon Supreme Court's decision in Dickson v. Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation (2020).

Amendment to section 11.3 of the Constitution.

Currently section 11.3 of the Constitution authorizes General Council to select qualified candidates to serve as the Naa Sháade Háni and Deputy Naa Sháade Háni in accordance with selection rules (currently Schedule B) for a four-year term. The provision confirms that the General Council can remove either the Naa Sháade Háni or the

Deputy Naa Sháade Háni at any time for circumstances it considers appropriate. Finally, section 11.3 authorizes the General Council to exercise an interim appointment for the purposes of filling a vacancy in the office of either the Naa Sháade Háni or Deputy Naa Sháade Háni with another Executive Council to complete a four-year term in circumstances where the vacancy arises as a result of a removal (by General Council), the Naa Sháade Háni's is unable to act (incapacitated) or death.

It is recommended that section 11.3 of the Constitution be amended to provide General Council with the flexibility to respond to extenuating circumstances where

- a vacancy in the office of the Naa Sháade Háni may arise as a result of a resignation; or
- the Naa Sháade Háni is nearing the end of his or her term and General Council is not prepared to select a new Naa Sháade Háni for a four-year term; or
- the General Council decides it is necessary to extend the four (4) term of the existing Naa Sháade Háni.

Approval of Leadership Process to confirm the Naa Sháade Háni for 2020.

On February 27, 2020 General Council concluded that additional clan consultations were required before enacting a Teslin Tlingit law

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that would replace Schedule B of the Constitution and allow for a general election of the Naa Sháade Háni for the 2020-2024 term (see attached Resolution #2020.02.26.006). Executive Council was directed to complete the consultations and General Council was scheduled to reconvene on April 1, 2020 to conclude their deliberations surrounding the proposed law titled Naa Sháade Háni áwé kaa káa wudsageedí – the election of a leader (the “proposed law”) and confirm a process to select the Naa Sháade Háni for the 2020-2024 term.

Due to COVID19 global pandemic which threatened the health of Teslin Tlingit elders, families and community, the clan consultations were suspended and the General Council meeting has been postponed to July 3-4, 2020.

As the Speaker I have maintained contact and have consulted with the Elders Council, Clan Leaders and appointed Clan Spokespersons and Executive Council in preparation for the July 3-4, 2020 meeting.

There is a recommendation that General Council suspend the enactment of the proposed law and consider an interim appointment of a Naa Sháade Háni for a period of (12 or 18) months. The recommendation for an interim appointment is to allow for additional time to focus on the health and wellbeing of the community (post COVID19), conclude the clan consultations

as originally directed in February 2020 and finalize a leadership selection process that integrates both Tlingit customs and general election considerations.

For the purpose of confirming a leadership selection process and in preparation of confirming a Naa Sháade Háni at the Annual General Council Assembly, General Council may choose to:

Option A - enact the proposed law and commence with a general election for the Naa Sháade Háni and Deputy Naa Sháade Háni for the 2020-2024 term;

Option B - confirm the selection of the Naa Sháade Háni for the 2020-2024 in accordance with Schedule B of the Constitution; or

Option C - authorize an interim appointment of a Naa Sháade Háni for a period of (12 or 18) months.

A draft resolution has been prepared for each option and are attached to this Notice for your reference in advance of the General Council meeting. Please note that Option C has two resolutions. Resolution C.1 provides for the General Council’s decision to be based on a recommendation provided by either a committee of designated Elders Council representatives or a committee of designated Clan Leaders and appointed Clan Spokespersons. Resolution C.2 provides that the interim appointment would be selected by the General Council in accordance with rules prescribed in the resolution.

Dickson v. Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation (2020)

The Executive Council is seeking General Council’s authorization to protect Teslin Tlingit aboriginal and treaty rights and interests in response the Yukon Supreme Court’s decision in Dickson v. Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation 2020 YKSC 22 (the “Dickson case”). Justice Ron Veale issue his decision on June 8, 2020.

The Dickson case is based on a Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation citizen’s challenge to a section in the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation Constitution, requiring elected member of the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation Council to relocate (if necessary) and reside on Settlement Land during their term of office. The Vuntut Gwitchin citizen claimed that the residency requirement violates section 15 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, 1982 (the “Charter”).

The governments of Canada and Yukon intervened in the Dickson case. Canada argued that the Charter applies to all governments in Canada, including aboriginal governments. Yukon argued that Charter applies to the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation laws based on the interpretation that the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation Self-Government Agreement is a delegation of federal and territorial laws to the Vuntut Gwitchin and therefore the charter obligations follow such delegation.

The Dickson case represents the first opportunity for the Yukon

Supreme Court to consider whether the Charter applies to self-governing Yukon First Nations

Justice Veale ruled that the Charter applied to the Vuntut Gwitchin First Nation government and residency requirement within their Constitution.

Historically TTC has maintained with Canada and Yukon that the Charter does not apply to its laws and institutions based on the following reasons.

-The Teslin Tlingit Council Final and Self-Government Agreements, and the associated federal and territorial legislation that brought these agreements into effect, are the recognition not the creation of

Teslin Tlingit aboriginal rights and interests.

-There is no express provision in the Teslin Tlingit Council Final or Self-government Agreement that state that the Charter applies to Teslin Tlingit laws or institutions.

-The application of the Charter to Teslin Tlingit Council should not apply in the absence of a negotiated agreement. If Teslin Tlingit Council is to be recognized as a government for the purpose of the Charter then Teslin Tlingit Council should be afforded all the same legal rights as other provincial governments if expected to uphold the obligations of the Charter.

The Executive Council is seeking

authority from the General Council to intervene if Justice Veale's decision is appealed or initiate negotiations with one or more of the Government of Canada, the Yukon Government and other Yukon self-governing First Nations to determine if and how the Charter would apply to Teslin Tlingit Council laws and/or institutions

We do not anticipate any delays to the project due to COVID-19. We are moving full steam ahead with the initial design of the bridge and we hope to be able to share that with you later this fall and hear what you think.

We have also been doing some initial research on what the environmental and socio-economic impacts might be and will be continuing this research on the ground this summer. We

are working closely with the Yukon Environmental and Social-economic Assessment Board (YESAB) and will be undertaking an extensive assessment before design is complete. Stay tuned for opportunities to participate and contribute any comments or questions.

As contracting opportunities come up for this project, we will be posting them on the Tender Management System, so be sure to check on Yukon.ca throughout the summer.

June 12, 2020 – Update on COVID-19

The Government of Yukon has the following updates on measures being taken in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 case count

As of today, June 12, at 2 p.m. the COVID-19 case count remains at 11 in the territory. All of the 11 people who have contracted COVID-19 in Yukon have recovered. There are no active cases in the territory and 1,235 people have been tested. We have had no new cases since April 20.

State of emergency extended

On the advice of the Chief Medical Officer of Health, the Government of Yukon is extending the state of emergency under the Civil Emergency Measures Act (CEMA) for another 90 days, as of today. This will allow the government to continue to use every tool at its disposal to protect the health and safety of Yukoners during the COVID-19 pandemic.

As the pandemic continues to evolve and there continues to be nationwide transmission of COVID-19, the Government of Yukon is continually evaluating the situation and will adjust measures as necessary. The state of emergency can be cancelled at any time, or can continue to be extended by 90 days so long as the pandemic continues to pose a risk to Yukoners.

Violations of the orders under the CEMA are an offence and are punishable by a fine or

imprisonment. A full list of the orders and legislative changes made under the Civil Emergency Measures Act can be found at yukon.ca/en/health-and-wellness/covid-19/legislation-changes-covid-19

Guidelines released for visitors at long-term care facilities

Outdoor visits for long-term care residents are now permitted with the release of a staged plan for the reopening of long-term care facilities in Yukon to visitors. Currently residents can identify one visitor with whom they can visit in a pre-set outdoor location. The reintroduction of visitors is staged over four phases, similar to the Yukon government's Path Forward plan. Phase 2 will permit two outdoor visitors at the same time.

The territory's five long-term care homes were closed to all visitors and volunteers on March 16 to avoid introduction of COVID-19 into long-term care homes. In Canada the highest number of deaths is attributed to COVID-19 in nursing and long-term care homes.

Faith-based services

Beginning this Sunday, June 7, places of worship will be permitted to open. Service organizers and attendees are required to adopt steps to ensure physical distancing, even adapting the nature of their services where necessary

Updates to A Path Forward: Yukon's plan for lifting COVID-19 restrictions

Following the announcement about the anticipated start of Phase II on July 1, Yukon's plan for lifting COVID-19 restrictions has been updated to include specific dates and new timelines. Updated guidance for critical and essential service workers released

The Government of Yukon's guidance for critical and essential workers has been updated this week to provide greater clarity to workers delivering critical and essential services in the territory between now and July 1, 2020. After July 1, 2020, restrictions will be eased for critical and essential workers entering Yukon from BC.

As plans for reopening move forward and there is no presence of COVID-19 in Yukon, we are reducing the number of updates. The regular COVID-19 updates will move to once a week beginning Wednesday, June 17, at 2 p.m.

Dear Parents/Guardians;

As Yukon school communities finish up their school year, the Government of Yukon has turned our attention to planning for the start of the 2020-21 school year.

The territory is working towards Phase 2 of Yukon's reopening plan and anticipates being in Phase 2 on July 1. This is positive news as we look ahead to August when students are set to return to school.

Plan for the 2020-21 school year

Based on the current information and situation, we are planning for Kindergarten to Grade 12 students to return to classes in school at the start of the 2020-21 school year and to return students to classes based on specific health and safety guidelines for K-12 public schools developed with Yukon's Chief Medical Officer of Health.

Health and safety is our first priority. To ensure students and staff can return safely to school, the Department of Education's central administration will be working with school principals and staff to begin planning their operations to follow health and safety guidance for K-12

public schools and to ensure they meet the unique needs and context of their school community. Initial guidance has been provided to start this planning and more detailed health and safety guidelines will also be developed before the start of the 2020-21 school year.

Our plan for the 2020-21 school year and the initial guidance for K-12 school settings are attached for your reference so you can learn more.

Each school will be sharing more information in August before the start of the school year so students and families know what to expect on their first day back to school.

School Bus Registration

Students will be able to ride the school bus as they return to classes at school while following new health and safety guidelines that will be developed. Health and safety is our first priority and we will be working with our student transportation contractor, Standard Bus, over the summer months to determine how we may need to adjust how students ride the bus.

Families in Whitehorse with children who normally ride the

school bus should register to ensure we have enough buses for all students and our bus routes meet the needs of students and families. Rural families should contact the school for busing information

COVID-19 MEASURES TO HELP CANADIANS

You may be eligible to receive some of these credits and benefits that the Government of Canada has introduced to help Canadians during the COVID-19 pandemic.



Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB)

The CERB provides temporary income support to workers who have stopped working and are without employment or self-employment income for reasons related to COVID-19. The benefit amount of \$2,000 will be paid in blocks of four weeks (up to a maximum of 16 weeks).
Canadians can now apply for CERB through My Account or the automated phone line.



Canada Emergency Student Benefit (CESB)

The CESB provides financial support to post-secondary students and recent post-secondary and high school graduates who are unable to find work due to COVID-19. This benefit is for students who do not qualify for the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) or Employment Insurance (EI). From May to August 2020, CESB provides a payment to eligible students of \$1,250 for each 4-week period or \$2,000 for each 4-week period to students with dependents or a disability.

Students and recent graduates will be able to apply for CESB through My Account or the automated phone line starting May 15, 2020.



Goods and Services Tax/Harmonized Sales Tax (GST/HST) Credit

The Government provided a one-time special payment on April 9, 2020. This payment doubles the maximum annual GST/HST credit amounts for the 2019-2020 benefit year. The average increase for those eligible will be close to \$400 for single individuals and \$600 for couples.

You will get the extra payment automatically if you normally receive the GST/HST credit and have filed a 2018 tax return.



Canada child benefit (CCB)

The Government increased the maximum annual CCB amounts for the 2019-2020 benefit year, by up to \$300 per child. The overall increase for families will be, on average, \$550.

You will get the payment increase automatically as part of your May payment if you normally receive the CCB, have filed a 2018 tax return, and have a child under the age of 18.

The income tax deadline for individuals has been extended to June 1, 2020, and the deadline to pay amounts owed has been extended to September 1, 2020.

A Path Forward: Yukon's plan for lifting COVID-19 restrictions

Our goal is a phased approach to easing restrictions, while staying safe from the pandemic. At all times we aim to contain the spread of COVID-19 and stop its importation to the territory. Because the situation is rapidly evolving and because so many of the actions Yukon takes will be informed by COVID-19 conditions in other provinces, territories and neighbouring jurisdictions, this Yukon plan is a living document.

Decisions about when and how to move forwards or backwards will be guided by six key criteria:

1. Yukoners are following the public health orders, directions and the 6 steps to staying safe.
2. Preventative measures and guidelines are in place and being complied with.
3. High capacity for testing and contact tracing is available.
4. Travel restrictions and self-isolation measures are keeping Yukon safe.
5. Health system capacity is meeting current needs and prepared to respond to changing conditions.
6. There is no community-spread of COVID-19.

Canadians across the country and around the world show their pride in their history, culture and achievements. It's been a day of celebration, where many festivities are held across the country, since 1868.


The Creation of Canada Day
